Highlights from the June 1st General Meeting:


- Winners from the Memorial Day fishing tournament were:






Fish Survey

You might have noticed the DNR on the lakes a week or so ago. They were conducting a fish survey. Larry Koza, District Fish Biologist with the DNR, reported some preliminary findings: " There were a lot of shad, mostly 6 to 7" long, which would be the fish spawned last year. Also we got a lot of bluegills, mostly 5 to 7", none reached 8". We did collect a lot of quality size bass from Royer. The biggest one was probably pushing 7 pounds, although we didn't have a scale to weight it. We had 5 in the 18" range, 3 in the 19" range and 4 over 20". That's exceptional for June sampling. Also a couple dozen channel catfish up to 20" and quite a few suckers. About a dozen Walleyes, all last years' fish. Some other miscellaneous fish. " Larry will be at our August Hog Roast to give a more in depth report.

One Call Does It All

Your lake association has now received 501(c)(3) status! So what does this mean??

Fo

- The association is considered a not for profit group.
- We will be able to pursue public and private grants for helping to fund activities such as cleaning out the dead end channel.
- Donations can be tax deductible.
- The association will be governed by an elected Board of Directors.

This also means that The Fish and Royer Lake Association is required to follow by-laws and must keep detailed records and submit annual filings to the state and IRS. A complete copy of the by-laws is available on the website.

One of the areas of immediate consequence is the composition of the board and how elections are managed.

- The board is to be comprised of not more than 9 members, with at least 3 representatives from Royer, and 3 from Fish.
- Members will serve 2-year terms, with half of the board being elected each year. (For the initial board, half will be selected for a one-year term, the other half for a 2-year term).
- A nominating committee will present a slate of potential board members to the membership at least 30 days before the election.
- Board members will be elected at the 2nd
 Annual meeting. (This year on August 24th.)
- The new board will select officers, with rotating terms.
- Each dues paying household will have 1 vote.

Are you bugged by bugs??

"What comes to mind when you think of warm weather? Maybe a nice, relaxing day on the beach or lake? Or maybe it's the reminder that pesky bugs will be making their comeback for the summer. Out of all the little annoyances, mosquitoes are often considered the worst. In addition to being annoying, mosquitoes pose a serious threat to public health, as they transmit dangerous diseases like Zika and West Nile Virus. Luckily, there are several management strategies to help prevent mosquitoes from bugging you this summer. So, put down the citronella candle and take notes on how you can protect yourself from these pesky intruders.

Mosquitoes breed in standing or stagnant water and will lay about 300 eggs in their six- to eightweek lifespan. This is an overwhelming number of mosquitoes! One of the easiest ways to help manage mosquitoes is by dumping any buckets or small containers that have standing water in them, picking up litter and clearing gutters. These are all areas where little pockets of water will sit and become a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

In addition to making sure there is no standing water around your property....maintaining a buffer of beneficial vegetation such as swamp milkweed, pickerelweed, and arrowhead will help provide habitat for mosquito predators like dragonflies. Not only will the buffer help limit mosquitoes, it will also prevent an overload of nutrients from entering your water body."
